St. Dominic

St. Dominic, a Catholic priest, was born in Castile, Spain in 1170. He changed the Church with his dedication to prayer and education. Dominic helped to establish a religious order known today as the Dominican Order, whose priests travel and preach living a simple life of prayer and intellectual study. History reveals that St. Dominic was one of the first to preach and teach the Holy Rosary as a form of devotional prayer to our Blessed Mother Mary.

Dominic knew that a life rooted in prayer and being educated in the truths of our faith could lead us deeper into our relationship with God. Dominic's mother had a vision that her son would "light the world on fire" with his passion for prayer and religious study.

I myself have been inspired by reading about St. Dominic's passion for prayer and spiritual education. His teachings helped influence my decision to get a master's degree in Theology.
